Standard Grants

For 2023 and 2024 school years CEF hosts both a fall and spring standard grant cycle. The standard grant is for classroom enrichment and requires a written application. Dollar limits are \$2,500 for an individual applicant, \$6,000 for two or more classroom level teachers on the same application, and \$10,000 for a district or campus wide application. Grants are graded on creativity, lesson plan alignment with TEKS, sustainability and budget. This past year, video presentations were permitted to accompany the written grants which allowed teachers to walk the judges through their specific request.



Mini-Grants

The CEF Mini-Grant provides a monthly grant application opportunity from September through May. This Grant requires a request form and a 5–7-minute presentation in front of a panel of judges. Mini-grant requests have a \$500 limit. CEF awarded 25 mini-grants during the 22/23 school year and 22 mini-grants for the 23/24 school year. These grants immediately impact the classroom in a fun transformative way. Calallen teachers have come up with amazing classroom enhancement ideas over the years and CEF is honored to be able to support them.



Karleigh Harris


Karleigh Harris, born and raised in




All in for Kids


CISD Payroll Deduction


